FOREWORD

On behalf of the entire Archives International Auctions team, I would like to personally welcome you to our 89th auction and our ninth auction of 2023. We are proud to offer the Huntsville Collection of 75 lots of rarely seen, and desirable Arkansas, and Missouri Civil War Obsolete scrip notes, Arkansas Civil War Treasury Warrants, and a group of historic, 1850-60s, Cherokee Nation, and Indian Territory scrip notes, in one of the largest offerings of these rarities to ever appear in a single auction.

The Huntsville Collection was put together over many decades by a passionate collector who acquired dozens of rare notes, decades before the internet was available to help in the search for and acquisition of these elusive rarities. The Huntsville Collection represents a major collecting achievement and deserves recognition for the extensive variety of rarely seen banknotes from this era, with a considerable number of them making their first appearance at auction or to the collecting community.

Some of the many highlights include 24 different Arkansas Scrip notes from 14 different issuers with 17 of the notes being unlisted in Rothert. There are 5 Cherokee Nation or Indian Territory notes including 4 historic 1862, Cherokee Nation scrip notes, with 3 examples being from Tahlequah, Cherokee Nation (Oklahoma), and one from Fort Gibson, CN. Also, an unknown issuer, Wilson's Salt Works, Illinois River, Indian Territory completes the group and deserves further research but may possibly be another Cherokee Nation or related Native American tribe issuer.

We will be holding our 90th auction toward the end of December to mid-January 2024. We are now working on and actively seeking consignments for our Winter and Spring 2024 auctions to include U.S. and World Banknotes, Coins, Scripophily and Security Printing Ephemera as well as desirable numismatic & philatelic items. 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KEY TO CATALOGING

DEFINITIONS

SPECIMEN: An archival printing sample of a finished item, such as a stock certificate, banknote or stamp that is printed usually with "000000" serial numbers and may have "Specimen" overprinted on it and be punch canceled to invalidate it and prevent its use surreptitiously. Specimens were kept for a number of reasons, though usually as samples to give out to prospective customers to give them an idea of the type and quality of the work that the printing company was capable of doing. Usually specimens were printed in limited amounts at the beginning of a printing run to evaluate the quality of the printing work and color combinations at an early stage, rather than have an entire production run rejected due to some minor flaw that was not found until after the printing was completed. A specimen is similar to the final product, printed on the same paper and in the same color.

COLOR TRIAL SPECIMENS: Sometimes specimens would be printed in numerous color combinations not used on the final note for evaluation before a final printing. These are usually extremely rare.

PROOF: An initial pull or impression from a plate or die for evaluation of text, vignette, engraving, and esthetic appeal and to check for any errors or faults. These were usually printed on india paper mounted on card or printed on some form of paper or light card. The amount of proofs printed is usually extremely small and usually number only a handful. Proofs allowed the printing company to evaluate the quality of the item being printed without having to go to the expense of making final plates and finding out small errors that could have been repaired at an earlier stage. Usually, proofs are single impressions of banknotes, stamps, vignettes, etc. Anything that was made into a plate, such as a sheet of 100 stamps could have had proof impressions taken from it. These would be called plate proofs (for multiple images) versus die proofs (usually of a single or small amount of images).

COLOR TRIAL PROOF: A proof printed in a color other than the issued color.

ESSAY SPECIMEN or PROOF: A proposed design that was not used but may be similar or even totally different to a final approved design. An artist, engraver or company may have proposed a number of different designs and color combinations to a client for his approval. If a design is rejected and never used, it could be called an essay.

PRODUCTION MATERIAL: Material found in files used in the production of security printed documents, banknotes, stamps and such. It may include correspondence, photographs, artwork, and signature samples, samples of other printed items that are marked up with corrections as well as proofs, specimens, essays, models, mockups and issued final items.

MODEL: A proposed or final design that may include original artwork, pieces of design elements such as borders, titles, vignettes, corporate seals, undertints and possibly portions of photographs. Before an engraved item was made, a design had to be decided on. This portion of the design process allowed for the artistic skills of the engraver or design department to be exhibited. Before the" digital age", banknote engravers and designers would cut up portions of other engraved items and re-apply them in a different form or design to come up with a unique new stamp, banknote or certificate. Often, all new engravings or "vignettes" of people or scenes would be engraved first to include in the new "work of art", and other times, portions of different completed items would be "borrowed" to use on a newly designed item. All models are rare and almost all of them are unique.



ARKANSAS

BERRYVILLE - BERRYVILLE IS ONE OF THE COUNTY SEATS OF CARROLL COUNTY AND IS A CITY LOCATED IN THE OZARK MOUNTAINS. THE AREA WAS SETTLED IN THE 1830S AND WAS AN ESTABLISHED TOWN BY THE 1850S. LIKE A FEW OTHER CITIES IN ARKANSAS, BERRYVILLE WAS INHABITED BY CONFEDERATE AND UNION FORCES AT DIFFERENT POINTS DURING THE CIVIL WAR. GUERILLAS TARGETED BERRYVILLE THROUGHOUT THE PERIOD, AND BY THE WAR'S END, MUCH OF THE TOWN WAS BURNED. BERRYVILLE SLOWLY REBUILT ITSELF AND IS KNOWN FOR EDUCATION AND AGRICULTURE TODAY.





Karnes. \$2, Unlisted in Rothert, Issued obsolete scrip note, Dated May 1st, 1862, Black text, Plain design, "S.A. Karnes" in pencil on back, Face has text "In Confederate Notes, Arkansas War Bonds, or Treasury Warrants", S/N 961, VF to Choice VF condition with uneven margins and a 3 mm tear on the top left border that is difficult to see, Foster, Printer, Fort Smith. No previous example of this issuer could be found....... Est. \$1000-2000

CARROLLTON - CARROLLTON WAS ONCE THE SEAT OF CARROLL COUNTY AND IS NOW AN UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITY IN NORTHWEST ARKANSAS. NAMED FOR THE SIGNER OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE, CHARLES CARROLL, CARROLLTON WAS HOME TO A POST OFFICE AND OTHER BUSINESSES BEFORE THE CIVIL WAR. SKIRMISHES WITH LOCAL NATIVE AMERICAN TRIBES LED TO THE CREATION OF A MILITIA, LATER CALLED UPON TO HELP RESTORE PEACE IN THE TUTT-EVERETT WAR. SOME OF THE SURVIVING CHILDREN OF THE 1857 MOUNTAIN MEADOWS MASSACRE, AN ATTACK ON ARKANSAS TRAVELERS BY MORMONS AND A FEW NATIVE AMERICANS, WENT ON TO LIVE IN CARROLLTON. UNFORTUNATELY, THE CIVIL WAR WREAKED HAVOC ON THE ESTIMATED 2,000 CITIZENS OF THE TOWN. THE AREA SAW SIGNIFICANT ACTION DURING THE WAR, AS MANY UNION UNITS CAMPED IN AND AROUND CARROLLTON. GUERRILLAS WERE ALSO ACTIVE IN THE EARLY 1860s, WHOSE DAMAGE CONTRIBUTED TO THE SLOW RECOVERY OF CARROLLTON FOLLOWING THE CIVIL WAR'S END.



CLARKESVILLE - CLARKESVILLE IS THE SEAT OF JOHNSON COUNTY, AN AREA LOCATED NEAR THE OZARKS FOOTHILLS AND THE ARKANSAS RIVER. ORIGINALLY INHABITED BY NATIVE AMERICANS, SUCH AS THE OSAGE AND THE CHEROKEE, EARLY SETTLERS ARRIVED WITH LAND GRANTS FOLLOWING THE WAR OF 1812. THE AREA WAS FURTHER POPULATED BY STEAMBOAT AND STAGECOACH TRAFFIC, WITH RAILROAD SERVICE ESTABLISHED ONLY AFTER THE CIVIL WAR. AS A RESULT OF ITS LOCATION NEAR THE ARKANSAS RIVER, THE CIVIL WAR SHAPED CLARKESVILLE. SOLDIERS FROM BOTH THE UNION AND CONFEDERATE ARMIES PASSED THROUGH THE CITY DURING THE CONFLICT. CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS CAMPED NEAR CLARKESVILLE IN 1861, WITH MANY DYING FROM WINTER CONDITIONS. A LOCAL CHURCH WAS USED AS A WARTIME HOSPITAL, AND THE UNION ARMY LATER BURNED THE BUILDING. DESPITE THE CIVIL WAR'S IMPACT ON CLARKESVILLE, THE RAILROAD LINE FROM LITTLE ROCK TO CLARKESVILLE HELPED TO RECOVER THE AREA. AN INFLUX OF GERMAN AND AUSTRIAN IMMIGRANTS, LURED BY LOCAL MINING, ALSO HELPED TO BOLSTER THE CITY. TODAY CLARKESVILLE IS THE LOCATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF THE OZARKS.





FAYETTEVILLE - FAYETTEVILLE IS THE COUNTY SEAT OF WASHINGTON COUNTY, LOCATED IN THE OZARKS. NAMED AFTER FAYETTEVILLE, TENNESSEE, A CITY CHARTER WAS GRANTED IN 1859. BEFORE THE CIVIL WAR, THE CITY WAS THE SITE OF SEVERAL EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, INCLUDING THE SECOND SCHOOL CHARTERED BY THE STATE OF ARKANSAS. THE CIVIL WAR DIVIDED THE CITY, AS BOTH CONFEDERATE AND UNION FORCES HELD FAYETTEVILLE DURING THE CONFLICT. IN 1863, FAYETTEVILLE WAS THE SITE OF MILITARY ACTION AS THE CONFEDERATE ARMY SOUGHT TO RECAPTURE THE CITY FROM UNION HANDS. THEY WERE UNSUCCESSFUL, AND FAYETTEVILLE REMAINED IN UNION CONTROL. LOCAL GOVERNMENT WAS SLOW TO EMERGE FOLLOWING THE CIVIL WAR, EXACERBATED BY THE STATE GOVERNMENT'S BANK RESTRICTION.

Watson. 25 Cents, Unlisted denomination in Rothert, Issued obsolete scrip note, Dated February 1862, Black text on face "In Merchandise or payable in Confederate Notes when 10, 20 or \$50 is presented at my counter", with blue signature at bottom right, Printed on tissue thin paper with initials in blue on back with bleed through onto face, Without S/N or faded S/N, Fine to Choice Fine condition with some rough margins and toning. No examples of this denomination have been offered at auction. Rare or possibly unique note.



Fayetteville, Washington County, Arkansas. R.R. Newel, 1862, \$1, Obsolete Scrip Note Fayetteville, Arkansas. 1862, R.R. Newel. \$1, (Rothert 200-3), Issued obsolete scrip note, Dated September 13th, 1862, Text on face "Payable in Confederate Notes and Missouri State Defense Bonds when in sums of \$10, \$20, or \$50 is presented to me", Black text, signature in black at bottom right, location spelled "Fayettville" at top center, S/N 550, Choice Fine to VF condition with light toning, fold lines, and rough margins. Rarity 7 in Rothert. No examples could be found at auction within the last 15 years.







Fayetteville, Washington County, Arkansas. W.A. Watson, 1862, \$1.50, Obsolete Scrip Note Fayetteville, Arkansas. February 7, 1862, W.A. Watson. \$1.50, Unlisted denomination in Pothert (Rothert 2042). Issued absolute scrip note. Dated Echnology 7th, 1862, Black text "Davidle in Confederate Notes when \$10, \$20 or \$50 is presented at my store." Signature

Huntsville - Huntsville is the seat of Madison County, located in the rural Arkansas Ozarks. Settled by Tennessee and Alabama explorers, the city was named after Huntsville, Alabama. Although Huntsville was not incorporated until after the Civil War, earlier events shaped the city. The Trail of Tears passed through Huntsville as displaced Native Americans traveled from the southeast to Indian Territory, located in Modern-day Oklahoma. Although Huntsville was not the site of any Civil War battles, the city was deeply affected by the conflict. Divisions were rife, with sympathies on both sides of the war. Neither the Union nor the Confederate army had control of Huntsville, which allowed for guerillas to be active in the region. Many locals lost their lives at the hands of guerrillas due to a lack of authority in the area. An infamous event occurred on January 10th, 1863, with the execution of nine local prisoners of war by the Union Army. Known as the Huntsville Massacre, these men were likely suspected to be Confederate guerillas and sympathizers. This event remains a stain on the history of Huntsville to the present day, and in 2006, the city erected a monument on the site of the massacre.

Smith. \$2.50, (Rothert 316-6), Issued obsolete scrip note, Dated June 4th, 1862, Black text on face "Payable in Confederate Notes when \$10, \$20 or \$50 is presented at my shop in Huntsville." with faded design at left, Signature in black ink on back, S/N 3285, VF to Choice VF condition. Rarity 7 in Rothert. The only previous example of this type to be found at auction was the low condition Rothert plate note. This example is far superior to that example. John Calvin Smith was born October 13, 1830 in TN and died January 29, 1901 in Tarrant County, Texas. He married Elizabeth Caroline Fagan on January 28, 1849 in Cannon County, TN. J.C. Smith was a minister in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South and moved to Huntsville Arkansas in about 1853. he operated a general store on the Huntsville square and thus the reason for issuing this note. This note is dated June 24, 1862 before the Civil War really came home to Huntsville. From late 1862 through 1864, the war would ravage Huntsville as it did most of north west Arkansas.

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KINGSTON - KINGSTON IS LOCATED IN MADISON COUNTY NEAR THE OZARK MOUNTAINS. DURING THE CIVIL WAR, A PAIR OF SKIRMISHES OCCURRED NEAR KINGSTON. BOTH WERE UNION VICTORIES. IT WAS THE SITE OF THE KINGSTON SCHOOL DISTRICT, ESTABLISHED AFTER THE CIVIL WAR. TODAY, KINGSTON IS A SMALL UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITY.



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RICHLAND - RICHLAND IS LOCATED IN SEARCY COUNTY, WHICH WAS FORMED IN 1838 FROM THE SOUTHERN PART OF MADISON COUNTY. THE BATTLE OF RICHLAND VALLEY TOOK PLACE IN MAY, 1863. NUMEROUS SKIRMISHES AND ENCOUNTERS OCCURRED IN THE AREA DURING THE CIVIL WAR, USUALLY WITH THE UNION FORCES BEING ATTACKED IN GUERILLA FASHION BY THE SMALLER CONFEDERATE FORCES.





SPRINGFIELD - SPRINGFIELD WAS ONCE CONWAY COUNTY'S SEAT OF GOVERNMENT AND GREW DUE TO ITS CONFLUENCE OF ROADS CONNECTING THE TOWN TO OTHER GROWING AREAS. THE CHEROKEE SETTLED SPRINGFIELD PRIOR TO THEIR DEPARTURE FOLLOWING THE TREATY OF 1828. SPRINGFIELD WAS THRIVING FOLLOWING ITS ELECTION AS COUNTY SEAT IN 1850, ALTHOUGH A TORNADO LATER REQUIRED MANY OF THE BUILDINGS IN TOWN TO BE REBUILT. TWO CONFEDERATE REGIMENTS WERE MUSTERED IN SPRINGFIELD, WHICH SET OFF A UNION COMPANY'S BURNING OF THE LOCAL COURTHOUSE IN 1864. THE WAR LEFT ITS MARK ON THE CITY, AS GROWTH FOLLOWING THE PERIOD WAS SLOW. THE ADVENT OF THE TELEPHONE AND AUTOMOBILE CONTRIBUTED TO THE DECLINE OF SPRINGFIELD, AND TODAY IT IS AN UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITY THAT IS STILL HOME TO A POST OFFICE THAT SERVES THE PUBLIC.



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WALDRON - WALDRON IS A CITY AND SCOTT COUNTY'S SEAT LOCATED NEAR THE OKLAHOMA BORDER IN THE OUACHITA MOUNTAINS. THE AREA GREW FROM LOCAL INDUSTRIES SERVING THE NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY, AS WELL AS AN INFLUX OF TRAVELERS FROM THE FORTH SMITH/RED RIVER ROAD. LIKE MUCH OF THE REGION, WALDRON WAS NOT UNTOUCHED BY THE CIVIL WAR AND WAS THE SITE OF SEVERAL UNION ATTACKS IN 1863. THE UNION ARMY SOUGHT TO CONSOLIDATE POWER IN WESTERN ARKANSAS AND ELIMINATE THE LAWLESSNESS OF GUERRILLA BANDS THAT THREATENED THE AREA. UNFORTUNATELY, THE DEPARTING UNION ARMY LAID WASTE TO WALDRON, BURNING MUCH OF THE TOWN TO PREVENT IT FROM BECOMING OF USE TO THE CONFEDERATE MILITARY. ORDER AND COMMUNITY WERE SLOW TO RETURN TO WALDRON FOLLOWING THE WAR. IT WAS ONLY WITH THE ARRIVAL OF A BRANCH OF THE KANSAS CITY SOUTHERN RAILROAD (KCS) THAT WALDRON ONCE AGAIN BEGAN TO EXPERIENCE A STABLE POPULATION GROWTH.

WESLEY - WESLEY, ARKANSAS IS LOCATED IN MADISON COUNTY, 13 MILES FROM HUNTSVILLE, WHICH IS THE COUNTY SEAT. DURING THE CIVIL WAR, COUNTY RESIDENTS FORMED BOTH UNION AND CONFEDERATE COMPANIES, AND THE WAR DIVIDED FAMILIES AND FRIENDS. THE AREA WAS HIT HARD BY THE BUSHWHACKERS WHO RODE THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRYSIDE, STEALING AND PILLAGING. THEY BURNED HOMES, STOLE FOOD AND POSSESSIONS, AND LEFT MOST FAMILIES WITH LITTLE TO LIVE ON. IN THE 1850S, ARKANSAS WAS A FRONTIER STATE. BY 1860, ARKANSAS WAS HOME TO MORE THAN 110,000 SLAVES, AND ONE IN FIVE WHITE CITIZENS WAS A SLAVE OWNER.





YELLVILLE - YELLVILLE IS THE SEAT OF MARION COUNTY, LOCATED NEAR THE OZARK MOUNTAINS ALONG CROOKED CREEK. NAMED FOR ARCHIBALD YELL, ARKANSAS' FIRST REPRESENTATIVE IN CONGRESS, YELLVILLE ORIGINATED AS A SETTLEMENT CALLED SHAWNEETOWN. THE CITY OF YELLVILLE WAS INCORPORATED IN 1855, SHORTLY AFTER A POLITICAL AND FAMILY FEUD BETWEEN THE TUTTS AND EVERETTS ESCALATED, CULMINATING IN THE ARRIVAL OF STATE MILITIA TO ARREST THE BELLIGERENTS AND RESTORE SOME ORDER. LOCATED IN THE NORTH OF MARION COUNTY, MANY OF YELLVILLE'S CITIZENS WERE DISPLEASED AT ARKANSAS' SECESSION FROM THE UNION. A CONFEDERATE CAMP, CAMP ADAMS, WAS LOCATED NEARBY, ALTHOUGH YELLVILLE REMAINED IN UNION HANDS. THE CITY WAS ALMOST ENTIRELY DESTROYED DURING THE WAR DUE TO THE HOSTILITIES BETWEEN THE TWO SIDES. BECAUSE OF THIS, YELLVILLE WAS SLOW TO EMERGE FROM THE WRECKAGE OF THE CIVIL WAR.

CHEROKEE NATION OBSOLETE SCRIP NOTE

FORT GIBSON, CHEROKEE NATION

FORT GIBSON - FORT GIBSON WAS ESTABLISHED IN 1824 BY UNITED STATES ARMY COLONEL MATTHEW ARBUCKLE.

ORIGINALLY A MILITARY GARRISON, FORT GIBSON WAS INTENDED TO SUPPORT THE UNITED STATES' WESTWARD EXPANSION AND THE SUBSEQUENT REMOVAL OF NATIVE AMERICANS. DURING THE 1830s, THE U.S. ARMY BEGAN CONCERTED EFFORTS TO ENSURE PEACE AMONG THE TRIBES IN INDIAN TERRITORY. IN 1834, GENERAL HENRY LEAVENWORTH LED THE DODGE-LEAVENWORTH EXPEDITION ON A MISSION TO THE WEST, FINALLY ESTABLISHING CONTACT WITH LOCAL INDIAN TRIBES.

AROUND THIS TIME, A TOWN WAS FORMED NEARBY AND WAS HOME TO THE FAMILIES OF MILITARY MEN, INDIANS SEEKING MILITARY PROTECTION, AND FREE AFRICAN AMERICANS. IN THE 1850s, THE CHEROKEE PRESSED CONGRESS TO CLOSE FORT GIBSON DUE TO LIQUOR AND BROTHELS, AND IN 1857, THE MILITARY ABANDONED THE GARRISON. THE TOWN WAS RENAMED KEE-TOO-WAH BY THE CHEROKEE. THE UNION ARMY REOCCUPIED FORT GIBSON DURING THE CIVIL WAR AND WAS BRIEFLY RENAMED FORT BLUNT. MILITARY PRESENCE FLUCTUATED THROUGH THE YEARS, AND IN 1898, THE TOWN OF FORT GIBSON WAS INCORPORATED, DRAWING ALL LOCALITIES UNDER ONE JURISDICTION.

Nash, the largest general merchant in Fort Gibson, was born in Louisiana in 1837, and received his education in New Orleans. His father, N. H. Nash, was a native of Massachusetts, who came to Louisiana when a young man. The family emigrated from England in the seventeenth century and settle in Massachusetts, and the grandfather of F. H. Nash served in the war of the Revolution. F. H. Nash removed to Van Buren, Arkansas, in 1853, having completed his education, and in August of the same year removed to Fort Gibson, of which city he is now the oldest white inhabitant. On his arrival the place was one of the most quiet country towns he had ever visited, and he was first employed by the sutler of the army post. He had a personal acquaintance with every commander of the post from the time of his arrival until the post was removed in 1858; it was returned eight years later and re-established. Among the most prominent of his acquaintances before the Civil war were: H. M. Black, now United State quartermaster; General William L. Coble, of Dallas, Texas; Colonel Pictairn Morrison; Captain Henry Little; Colonel Ed Brooks, who afterwa





TAHLEQUAH, CHEROKEE NATION


TAHLEQUAH, THE CHEROKEE NATION - IN 1846, THE U.S. GOVERNMENT AND THE CHEROKEE NATION SIGNED A NEW TREATY BASED ON THE TERMS OF THE TREATY OF NEW ECHOTA. TAHLEQUAH, WAS MADE THE NEW CAPITAL OF THE CHEROKEE NATION. THEY BUILT GOVERNMENT BUILDINGS, SCHOOLS, BUSINESSES AND HOMES. IN 1844 THE NATION ESTABLISHED THE CHEROKEE ADVOCATE NEWSPAPER, WHICH WAS PUBLISHED IN BOTH ENGLISH AND CHEROKEE (USING THE SYLLABARY INVENTED BY THE GREAT CHEROKEE SCHOLAR AND EDUCATOR, SEQUOYAH). JOHN ROSS SERVED AS THE PRINCIPAL CHIEF UNDER THE NEW CONSTITUTION AND THE CHEROKEE NATION FOR MANY YEARS WAS A THRIVING COMMUNITY. THE OUT BREAK OF THE AMERICAN CIVIL WAR IN 1861 REVIVED OLD RIVALRIES AND DIVISIONS IN THE NATION. UNION FORCES ABANDONED FORTS ADJOINING THE CHEROKEE NATION FOR BASES IN KANSAS. CONFEDERATE FORCES IN TEXAS THREATENED TO INVADE THE CHEROKEE AND OTHER INDIAN NATIONS, SO MANY OF THE CHEROKEE AGREED TO SIGN TREATIES OF ALLIANCE WITH THE CONFEDERACY. SOME CHEROKEES TOOK UP ARMS IN SUPPORT OF THE CONFEDERACY, WHILE OTHERS FOUGHT FOR THE UNION. PRINCIPAL CHIEF, JOHN ROSS TRAVELED TO WASHINGTON, D.C. IN FEBRUARY 1863 AND THE CHEROKEE NATIONAL COUNCIL VOLUNTARILY ABOLISHED SLAVERY IN THE CHEROKEE NATION AS A MATTER OF TRIBAL LAW.

ILLINOIS RIVER, INDIAN TERRITORY (OKLAHOMA) - A NEW TREATY WAS SIGNED BETWEEN THE CHEROKEE INDIANS AND THE U.S. GOVERNMENT IN 1828, WHICH GAVE THEM CONTROL OF THE AREA WHICH WAS LOCATED IN EASTERN OKLAHOMA, AND WHO COULD SETTLE AND WORK THERE. THE ILLINOIS RIVER WAS KNOWN FOR ITS SALT PRODUCTION FROM ITS MANY SALT SPRINGS. BY 1833, THERE WERE AT LEAST 6 SALT WORKS IN THE CHEROKEE NATION. IN 1843, THE CHEROKEE NATION REMOVED LOCAL NON-CHEROKEE OPERATORS AND LEASED THE WORKS TO DIFFERENT OPERATORS WHO DEPENDED ON AFRICAN AMERICAN SLAVE LABOR. SALT GARNERED A LARGE PRICE IN THE INDIAN TERRITORY BEFORE AND AFTER THE CIVIL WAR AND DURING THE WAR, THE PRICE BECAME EXORBITANT DUE TO UNION AND CONFEDERATE COMMANDERS CONFISCATING THE WORKS TO SUPPLY THEIR SOLDIERS. THE ARRIVAL OR THE RAILROAD IN THE 1870S ENDED THE PRODUCTION OF SALT DUE TO TRANSPORTATION PROVIDING CHEAPER SUPPLIES OF SALT.





VAN BUREN - VAN BUREN IS THE COUNTY SEAT OF CRAWFORD COUNTY, LOCATED NEAR THE OKLAHOMA BORDER IN WHAT WAS ONCE INDIAN TERRITORY. ITS LOCATION ALONG THE ARKANSAS RIVER AND PROXIMITY TO INDIAN TERRITORY HELPED VAN BUREN BECOME A TRADE CENTER IN THE 1800s. THE CITY SAW MILITARY ACTION DURING THE CIVIL WAR. UNION FORCES, MARCHING AFTER A VICTORY IN WASHINGTON COUNTY, CAPTURED THE CITY IN THE BATTLE OF VAN BUREN IN 1862. THE UNION ARMY THEN DESTROYED PARTS OF THE CITY, INCLUDING A PRINTING PRESS, STEAMBOATS, AND A FERRY. HUNDREDS OF SLAVES WERE FREED BY UNION FORCES FOLLOWING THE CITY'S CAPTURE. THE CITY WENT ON TO BE THE HOME OF MANY FORMER SLAVES WHO SETTLED IN THE AREA.

LITTLE ROCK - LITTLE ROCK IS THE COUNTY SEAT OF PULASKI COUNTY AND THE CAPITAL OF ARKANSAS. LOCATED NEAR THE STATE'S CENTER, LITTLE ROCK WAS SETTLED IN THE EARLY 1800S AND WAS NAMED AFTER THE LOCAL ROCK FORMATIONS. LIKE MANY CITIES IN ARKANSAS, LITTLE ROCK WAS IMPACTED BY THE CIVIL WAR. THE UNPROTECTED STATE GOVERNMENT MOVED TO HOT SPRINGS IN GARLAND COUNTY FOR A SHORT TIME FOLLOWING THE RETREAT OF THE CONFEDERATE ARMY EAST. LITTLE ROCK WAS CAPTURED AND OCCUPIED BY UNION TROOPS IN 1863. FOLLOWING THE WAR, LITTLE ROCK ESTABLISHED A CEMETERY, WHICH CONTAINS THE REMAINS OF BOTH UNION AND CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS. THE MOST FAMOUS EVENT IN LITTLE ROCK'S HISTORY OCCURRED IN 1957 WITH THE DESEGREGATION OF LITTLE ROCK CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL. THE CONFLICT BETWEEN WHITE AND BLACK AMERICAN CITIZENS CAST INTERNATIONAL ATTENTION ON THE ISSUE OF RACE RELATIONS IN THE UNITED STATES. TODAY LITTLE ROCK REMAINS THE CULTURAL AND POLITICAL CENTER OF THE STATE.

HARRISONVILLE - HARRISONVILLE IS THE COUNTY SEAT OF CASS COUNTY, MISSOURI, LOCATED TO THE SOUTHEAST OF KANSAS CITY, NEAR THE KANSAS BORDER. NAMED FOR CONGRESSMAN ALBERT G. HARRISON, HARRISONVILLE WAS SETTLED IN THE 1830s. THE CIVIL WAR GREATLY IMPACTED THE CITY, WITH LOCAL ORDER SLOW TO EMERGE FOLLOWING THE CONFLICT. TODAY HARRISONVILLE IS HOME TO SEVERAL HISTORIC SITES AND IS PART OF THE KANSAS CITY METROPOLITAN AREA.

SARCOXIE, JASPER COUNTY - SARCOXIE IS A CITY IN THE JOPLIN METROPOLITAN AREA AND IS THE OLDEST CITY IN JASPER COUNTY, MISSOURI. SARCOXIE WAS SETTLED IN THE 1830S BY PIONEERS TAKING ADVANTAGE OF THE LOCAL ABUNDANCE. THE NAME SARCOXIE COMES FROM A DELAWARE INDIAN CHIEF WHO CAMPED NEAR A LOCAL SPRING. DURING THE CIVIL WAR, BOTH UNION AND CONFEDERATE ARMIES CAMPED IN THE SARCOXIE AREA, WITH THE CITY SEEING SOME DAMAGE FROM SKIRMISHES. SARCOXIE WAS SLOW TO EMERGE FROM THE CIVIL WAR, AND TODAY THE CITY IS KNOWN FOR ITS PEONIES AND OTHER FLOWERS.

JEFFERSON CITY - JEFFERSON CITY IS THE COUNTY SEAT OF COLE COUNTY AND IS MISSOURI'S CAPITAL. NAMED FOR PRESIDENT THOMAS JEFFERSON, EARLY FRONTIERSMEN EXPLORED THE AREA OF JEFFERSON CITY IN THE LATE 1600S. PIONEER DANIEL BOONE'S SON, DANIEL MORGAN BOONE LAID OUT THE CITY, AND IT GREW OVER THE DECADES AS A MIDWAY POINT BETWEEN ST. LOUIS AND KANSAS CITY. THE CIVIL WAR DIVIDED THE CITY. MANY RESIDENTS SUPPORTED THE SECESSION MOVEMENT, AND UNION TROOPS OCCUPIED JEFFERSON CITY UNDER MARTIAL LAW UNTIL 1865. ORDER WAS EVENTUALLY RESTORED WITH THE MISSOURI CONSTITUTION OF 1875. LOCAL INDUSTRIES EXPANDED, AND JEFFERSON CITY BEGAN TO EXPERIENCE STEADY GROWTH INTO THE 20TH CENTURY. IT IS HOME TO LINCOLN UNIVERSITY, AN HBCU FOUNDED BY AFRICAN AMERICAN CIVIL WAR VETERANS.


